




ROBERT SINCLAIR

When The Franklin Report recently asked Rob Sinclair, AIA, for five words that best describe his firm, he responded, "It's all about the process." So important is the process that the principal of Sinclair Associates Architects personally works with clients in every stage, from defining the design concept to walking them through their completed homes. Since founding the firm in 1982, Rob has worked with a small team of four associates to ensure that every client is actively engaged in the creation of his home.

Fundamental to Sinclair Associates' process is integration. In close conjunction with clients, Rob and his team work to create and, literally, edit the design program. After each initial interview, Rob drafts a narrative of the house, explaining the look and feel of each space with words and asking his clients to revise and rewrite as necessary. His clients are thus essential to the concept, themselves co-authors of their eventual homes. Once a vision is established, Rob brings the interior designer, builder and superintendent on board, forming a team unified around one central goal: to create a beautiful, harmonious environment that faithfully expresses the project's defining idea.







Because Sinclair Associates works very carefully to create beautifully balanced, fully integrated environments, the team is drawn to those clients who plan to spend the rest of their lives in their homes. As creating a custom home is often a lengthy endeavor, Rob makes certain that the clients and design teams with whom he chooses to collaborate are compatible in personality and mutually respectful so that all enjoy every aspect of the process and are proud of and happy with the outcome. Featured in *The Franklin Report, Architectural Digest, Robb Report* and *California Homes*, the firm's homes are visually exquisite. Yet of chief importance to Rob, each provides a deep sense of well-being for those who live therein.



Due to the rigor of the firm's process of investigating and arriving at the home's theme, each project embodies a decidedly different aesthetic. All are infused with a European sense of warmth and intimacy, established by the smaller scale and natural materials indicative of the region's architecture. By breaking up the massing and creating an intuitive flow of the home's spaces through qualities of natural light, from intimate to expansive light-filled spaces, the firm effectively evokes a mellifluous ambience that embraces residents and guests, filling them with a sense of peace. To this European feel, the team adds a minimalist touch, in essence cleaning up and paring down the clients' stylistic preference. Reducing the ornamentation and focusing instead on the quality of light, the relationship to the outdoors and the warm atmosphere that brings families together yields cohesive, harmonious atmospheres in even the largest homes.
